Small Millage Increase Still Spells Tax Cut

The County Commission finalized the Fiscal Year 11 budget, at the second and final Public Hearing last Tuesday night. Working within the confines of the economic downturn, reduced property values, and revenue generation impediments from the state legislature, the County Commission approved a balanced budget.

Budget Details:

- \$3.9 million was cut from County commission Departments and programs
- County commissioners cut 19.85 full-time positions
- The general fund, which is the major source of funding for County departments and the Constitutional Officers, totaled \$125.6 million down from \$128.2 million this current year.
- Combined, property tax rates rose 4.5 percent from 11.2675 mills to 11.7988 mills.
- Due to decreased property values, Alachua County taxpayers will pay less for the County portion of their tax bill. [Click here](#) to see a very useful "How Your Tax Dollar is Divided" chart.

The Alachua County Pink Heals Initiative event included live entertainment, informational booths, and guest speakers. The events was in two locations; 2 p.m. – 3 p.m. at the Downtown Community Plaza, and 3 p.m. – 7 p.m. at Butler Plaza West next to the Ale House.

Public Hearing on Comprehensive Plan Update

The Alachua County Board of County Commissioners will hold a public hearing on the update of the Alachua County Comprehensive Plan to implement the recommendations adopted by the Board in the [Evaluation and Appraisal Report](#) (EAR). The Commission will take comments from the public and provide direction on transmittal of the Comprehensive Plan amendments to the Florida Department of Community Affairs for review. The meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, October 5, 2010, at 5 p.m. in the Jack Durrance Auditorium on the second floor of the County Administration Building (12 SE 1st Street, Gainesville) and may also be viewed on the County's [Video on Demand](#) website live or any time thereafter.

A new Community Health Element and new Energy Element are proposed for inclusion in the Comprehensive Plan. Several Comprehensive Plan Elements are also proposed for update and revision including Future Land Use, Potable Water and Sanitary Sewer, Housing, Solid Waste, Stormwater, Conservation and Open Space, Recreation, Economic, Capital Improvements and Intergovernmental Coordination. Draft materials and background information for the update of the Comprehensive Plan are posted on online at <http://www.alachuacounty.us/ear>.

Final adoption of amendments to the Comprehensive Plan is required by April, 2011, as provided in the schedule established by the State of Florida.

MAIN STREET UPDATE

October 2010

Main Street between Depot Avenue and North Eighth Avenue is being reconstructed into a two-lane road with a center turn lane, bicycle lanes, bus bays and on-street parking. Underground utilities and traffic signals are also being upgraded.

The base of the road between North Eighth Avenue and North First Street was completed and reopened in May and construction began at the intersection of Depot Avenue in January. Work has been completed from Depot Avenue north to South Fourth Place, however, Depot Avenue east of Main Street remains closed as part of a City of Gainesville remediation project. The top layer of asphalt will be placed at the end of the entire project which is scheduled for Spring 2011.

The current work area is in front of the Alachua County Courthouse parking area and is expected to be completed by the end of October. Upcoming construction areas and approximate completion times are as follows:

- Courthouse - 1 month
- County Administration Building at SW Second Avenue - 2 months
- County Administration Building at SE First Avenue - 1.5 months
- Intersection of University Avenue - 1 week
- 100 block of Main Street - 3-4 weeks

These are ONLY estimated times and are contingent on cooperative weather, timely delivery of materials and many other unknowns.

DID YOU KNOW... workers on Main Street have:

- removed nearly 11,000 cubic yards of dirt to allow for construction
- placed 1,916 tons of structural asphalt
- installed 5,720 linear feet of pipe (storm, water and sanitary)
- placed 15,539 square yards of lime rock for the new road base
- constructed 7,863 linear feet of new curb and gutter and 1,322 square yards of new sidewalk and
- installed emergency vehicle signals at Fire Station One and four new traffic signals at four different intersections.

Registration forms are available online at VoteAlachua.com. You may use the application form to register to vote, update your voter information, or to update your signature by downloading the application. You may also register to vote in person at the Supervisor of Elections Office or by mail. For a list of other facilities in the county where voter registration application forms may be obtained, please visit our website or call the Supervisor of Elections Office at 352-374-5252. To vote in the General Election, mail-in applications must be postmarked no later than the October 4th deadline.

VOTE BY MAIL

Any registered voter may Vote by Mail. To request a ballot and Vote by Mail, voters may make their request online at VoteAlachua.com or call the Supervisor of Elections Office at 352-374-5252. Voters will need to make sure their address and signature on file with the Supervisor of Elections is current. Your mail ballot may not count if the signature does not match the signature on your voter record. The last day to request your ballot be mailed is Wednesday, October 27, 2010 by 5 PM.

To request a ballot for another voter, you must be a designated member of the voter's immediate family or a legal guardian.

Requests can be made online, in person, by mail, by telephone or by fax. All requests must include the voter's name, residence address, and date of birth. The request must also include the requestor's name, residence address, relationship to the voter and driver's license number if available. Mail or fax request must also include the requestor's signature.

A voter may designate in writing another person to pick up an absentee ballot starting Thursday, October 28, 2010. The designee must have a note signed by the voter, a picture identification of the designee and must complete an affidavit. The affidavit is available for download at VoteAlachua.com. The designee may not pick up more than two absentee ballots per election, not including the designee's own ballot and ballots for members of his or her immediate family.

Absentee ballots are available at the Supervisor of Elections Office for voters who may have emergencies that will not allow them to go to their polling place to vote.

All absentee ballots must be received in the Supervisor of Elections Office by 7 PM Election Day.

VOTE EARLY

Any registered voter may vote early. Florida Law requires voters to present picture and signature identification in order to vote, or vote a provisional ballot. Early Voting for the General Election will be available starting Monday, October 18, 2010 - Saturday, October 30, 2010.
