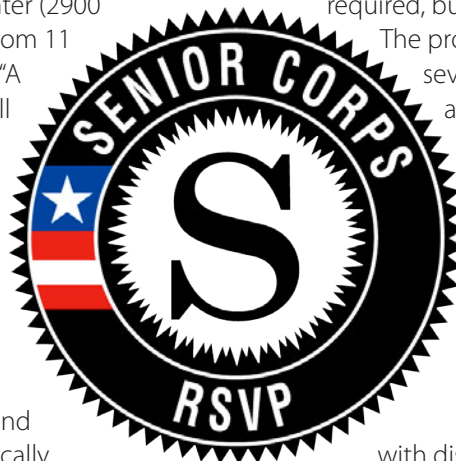
like to share their skills, knowledge, and talents, with others by volunteering. No minimum maximum number of service hours are required, but background checks are needed for some tasks.

Recycled Latex Paint Giveaway Event

The Alachua County Environmental Protection Department will be holding the 17th Annual Recycled Latex Paint Giveaway on Saturday, May 7, 2011. The event will distribute, free of charge, 3,600 gallons of 75% post consumer recycled latex paint to community organizations, civic groups and people with special needs. Residents who cannot afford the cost of new paint can use the recycled paint for homes and businesses.

The Recycled Latex Paint Giveaway event will begin at 8 a.m. at the Alachua County Hazardous Waste Collection Center, located at the Leveda Brown Environmental Park and Transfer Station, 5125 NE 63rd Avenue, 2 miles north of 39th Avenue, off Waldo Road. The recycled paint will be given away on a first-come, first-served basis and will be available in 5-gallon pails with six colors to choose from; off white, beige, gray, terra cotta, green and blue. There is a 10-gallon limit per resident.

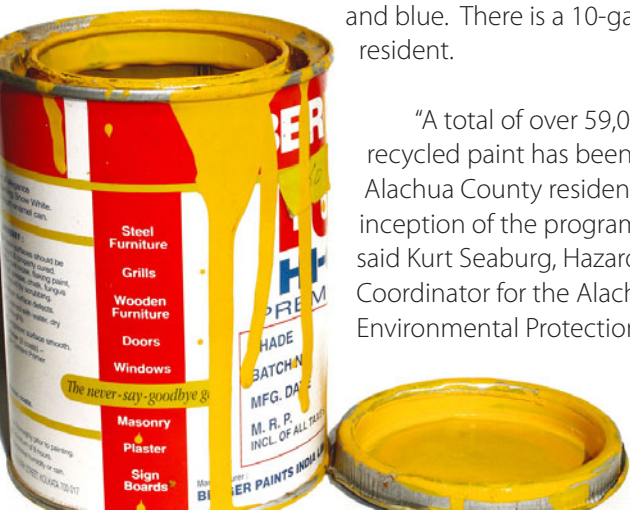
"A total of over 59,000 gallons of recycled paint has been provided to Alachua County residents since the inception of the program in 1994," said Kurt Seaburg, Hazardous Waste Coordinator for the Alachua County Environmental Protection Department.

"The program began as a means of assisting homeowners and agencies beautify their property while recycling a product that still has value."

The cost to recycle the paint is only slightly more than the cost to dispose of the unwanted paint by a solidification process. The latex paint is collected throughout the year by the Hazardous Waste Program and shipped to a paint manufacturer where it is blended and repackaged into a 75% post consumer paint and is suitable for either interior or exterior usage.

For any resident that is not able to attend the event, non-recycled free paint of varying quality and quantity, which is dropped off by residents who no longer need it, is available at the Alachua County Hazardous Waste Collection Center's Recycle/Reuse Area. Residents can pick up this paint and other household products during normal business hours: Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. until 5 p.m. and Saturday from 8 a.m. until noon.

Mosquito-Borne Illnesses Prevention

The Alachua County Health Department (ACHD) emphasizes the importance of protection against mosquito-borne diseases. Summer is rapidly approaching and with it comes the mosquito season. Mosquito activity peaks during the wetter summer months and so does the potential for transmission of mosquito borne diseases such as Eastern Equine Encephalitis and West Nile Virus.

Tips on Eliminating Mosquito Breeding Sites

- Elimination of breeding sites is one of the keys to prevention.
- Clean out eaves, troughs and gutters.
- Remove old tires or drill holes in those used in playgrounds to drain.
- Turn over or remove empty plastic pots.
- Pick up all beverage containers and cups.
- Check tarps on boats or other equipment that may collect water.
- Pump out bilges on boats.
- Replace water in birdbaths and pet or other animal feeding dishes at least once a week.
- Change water in plant trays, including hanging plants, at least once a week.
- Remove vegetation or obstructions in drainage ditches that prevent the flow of water.

“Alachua County’s surveillance system is comprised of sentinel chickens, surface water larvae counts, light traps, dead bird reports, citizen complaints, and signals from the medical and veterinary community. These systems can detect the presence of Eastern Equine Encephalitis and West Nile Virus in the County” said Anthony Dennis, Alachua County Environmental Health Director. “We urge all citizens to take steps to prevent being bitten by mosquitoes.”

Symptoms of West Nile virus (WNV) infection and Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE) may include headache, fever, fatigue, dizziness, weakness and confusion. Physicians should contact the local county health department if they suspect an individual may have a mosquito-borne illness. State of Florida Department of Health laboratories provide testing services for physicians treating patients with clinical signs of mosquito-borne diseases.

Tips on Repellent Use

Always read label directions carefully for the approved usage before applying a repellent to skin. Some repellants are not suitable for children.

Products with concentrations of up to 30 percent DEET are generally recommended. Other potential mosquito repellents, as reported by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in April 2005, contain picaridin or oil of lemon eucalyptus. These products are generally available at local pharmacies. Look for active ingredients to be listed on the product label.

Apply insect repellent to exposed skin, or onto clothing, but not under clothing.

In protecting children, read label instructions to be sure the repellent is age-appropriate. According to the CDC, mosquito repellents containing oil of lemon eucalyptus should not be used on children under the age of 3 years. DEET is not recommended on children younger than 2 months old.

Infants should be kept indoors or mosquito netting should be used over carriers when mosquitoes are present.

Avoid applying repellents to the hands of children. Adults should apply repellent first to their own hands and then transfer it to the child’s skin and clothing.

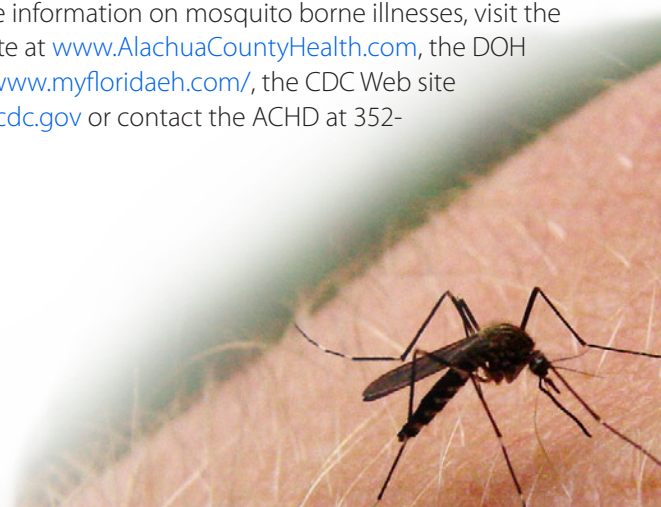
If additional protection is necessary, apply a permethrin repellent directly to your clothing. Again, always follow the manufacturer’s directions.

Monitoring wild bird deaths can help officials track the spread of some mosquito-borne diseases. Anyone who discovers a dead bird is encouraged to report it via the Internet. The bird mortality reporting system is located on the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission’s website at: www.myfwc.com/bird/. Citizens may also report dead birds to a county health department or local FWC office.

The ACHD advises citizens to protect themselves from mosquito bites by following the “5 D’s”

- Drainage – Rid the area around your home of standing water, which is where mosquitoes can lay their eggs.
- DEET – Repellents containing DEET (N,N-diethyl-meta-toluamide, or N,N-diethyl-3-methylbenzamide) are recommended to protect against mosquito exposure. Picaridin and oil of lemon eucalyptus are other repellent options. Always use repellants according to the manufacturer’s directions.
- Dress – Wear clothing that covers most of your skin.
- Dusk and Dawn – Avoid being outdoors when mosquitoes are most active.

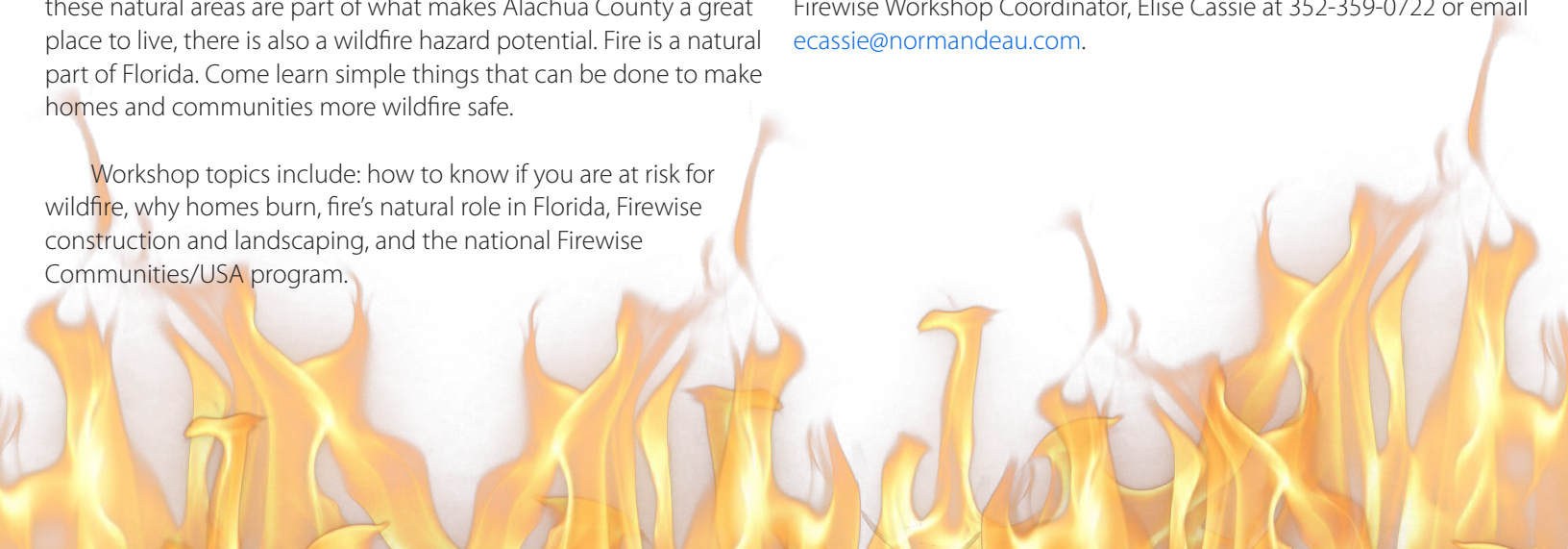

UP Renewal and DRC Development Plan Application

The board approved reducing submittal requirements and fees for the SUP renewal and DRC development plan application for C and D landfill operations under the following specific circumstances: At the time of SUP renewal, if the applicant is proposing no changes and no compliance or enforcement issues have occurred during the past 5 years, the county will charge a minor SUP fee (\$1,200) and allow the development plan to be reviewed as a minor amendment (\$800). This represents a fee reduction of 60 percent from the existing fee structure and this change would also remove the requirements for the SUP renewal to go to the Planning Commission, subsequently saving the applicant time as well.
